

Please note we do not expect artists to have a work completed before the actual exhibition dates and will accept sketches and concept drawings for selection.



The winner of the Blacktown City Art Prize will receive \$15,000.

3 supporting prizes will also be awarded:

This year, the winners of the **Local Artist Prize** and **Aboriginal Artist Prize** will also have the opportunity to undertake a 2-month residency in one of Blacktown Arts' Main Street studios.

Selected artworks will be exhibited at The Leo Kelly Blacktown Arts Centre from Saturday 30 November 2019 - Saturday 25 January 2020.

The two Davids have moved on to the next project which is to complete another retaining wall. The first rows of bricks are already in place. While David A is taking some time out David R is painstakingly placing the bricks in his absence. It will look wonderful once it is completed and the area between the main building and the pottery yurt will look tidier and make the trip to the toilets much safer for all.

BMCAC has been successful applying for a Club Grant. It's most welcome and will enable us to fix the end wall of the main building. This will be done once current work on the brick retaining wall is completed, most likely late 2019 or early 2020. Glenbrook Panthers have been a wonderful support over the years, and we thank them again for coming to our rescue.

I am about to advertise "Clay Creations", the potters' annual exhibition. Term 4 enrolments will be on the same day, 19th October, at the same venue, Glenbrook Theatre's side hall.

POTTERY FACILITATOR'S REPORT Bronwyn Campbell

Monday potters had a successful raku firing. We are still working on ways to reduce the firing time for each load. We are slowly learning to use the kiln more efficiently. Before the next firing I hope to repair the second kiln so we can have two going at a time. I would like to thank Michael Dausmann very much for his help all day even though he had no pots to fire. I would like to buy some fire bricks to build a solid base platform to sit the kiln on. At the moment we are using borrowed bricks to form a circle but this leaves a lot of air gaps even though we try to plug them up with clay. I think this would help make the firings more efficient.

Richard's Musings

Preview of Richard's Talk for the Opening of the "Body & Soul" Life Drawing & Painting Exhibition at the Glenbrook Theatre Hall, 20th September 2019.

I have a battle going on between my true self and false self. It is being waged between my inclination for security in just rendering the body of the model and my trying to read the masters and work like them and what they say Art is.

El Greco overcame his false self by means of his love of a particular paradox. He judged the quality of a work of art by the amount of ferocity in it, by which he meant a spiritual fire. But he also went for gracefulness. So, when these two qualities came together he had art. By gracefulness I think he meant the wholeness in the painting.

Then I read an aphorism of Degas "I must impress upon myself that I know nothing at all, for it is the only way to progress" and his saying "Art is vice, you don't marry it legitimately, you ravish it". He needed to overcome his mere academic self to gain real personal expression.

De Kooning saw a glow, a light in Soutine's paintings that he ended up hunting for the rest of his life. It was a creative light that shone through the energy of the work.

All these examples back up the gospel message of "Lose yourself to find yourself"! But sayings are one thing and copying from the masters is another. For instance, when copying Rembrandt's drawings, I realized that seeing whole and chasing the relationship between things and qualities is the way to put my foot on only rendering the body. I also realized that it is impossible to really draw a warm, volumed model realistically on a flat piece of paper. It is always going to be an interpretation, an impression fleshed on the page. Generosity of spirit, trusting and freeing one's hand goes a long way towards self-expression.

We are all in this age of crisis and for that reason this also impinges on our work. So, let's fly the true flag of freedom for the general public to see and celebrate another year of creativity at the Blue Mountains Creative Arts Centre. I think this is our 34th year of life drawing exhibitions. So, let's have a drink to that. I declare the exhibition open.

Resilience in Times of Adversity: Contemporary Responses to WW2 in the Blue Mountains 1939-1950

17 August – 29 September

Coinciding with the 80th anniversary of the commencement of WWII, Vivienne Dadour has curated the exhibition *Resilience in Times of Adversity: Contemporary Responses to WW2 in the Blue Mountains* that explores aspects of the personal, historical and political landscape of the Blue Mountains during, and post, WW2. Through the use of archival and historical material the exhibiting artists reflect on the many-sided nature of the tragedy of war and the resilience of the human spirit.

Installation artist Anne Graham pays homage to the many women and men who worked at the Lithgow Small Arms Factory; Chris Tobin (Darug) acknowledges the struggles of Aboriginal soldiers who were an occupied People, yet asked to be part of an imperialistic war; Fiona Davies responds to the resilience of returning soldiers suffering from infectious diseases when they experienced medical isolation in various facilities in the Blue Mountains during WW2; Sean O'Keeffe explores the fortitude of the many soldiers and military personnel who lived at 'Hoaxville' in facilities that housed chemical weapons in tunnels and sidings at Marrangaroo Army base in Lithgow; and Vivienne Dadour presents snapshots of life in the Blue Mountains through a collection of photographic archives.
